For that can be arbitrarily decided, against the law of the last 900 years, priests have been forbidden to marry, and then the Catholic Church decided to "reflect" on the concept of lifting the law. (Ultimately, in 2007 the Catholic church decided not to change the law forbidding priests to marry.) Would this work in the church that belongs to Christ? If God had given us a law concerning the celibacy of preachers, would we be willing to lift it? The Catholic Church, who claims the infallibility of the church, and its law, is willing to "modernize". In an open letter to the Pope, Milingo said "over 150,000 married priests stand waiting and willing to serve" the church. Is this a valid reason to change the "law"? Just because 150,000 priests are waiting to join does not give sufficient reason for a "church" that is to be established on "law" and "precept" to change.

As Christians, we realize that God's law cannot be arbitrarily lifted or changed, just to suit our fancy, or to "catch up" with societal mentality.
